The Pemaquid Lighthouse is one of Maine's most treasured landmarks. The Lighthouse was built in 1826 and holds a traditional Fresnel lens. During the summer months the Lighthouse & adjacent buildings are open to tourists. Be sure to bring a camera - the view from the Point is stunning!

A National Historic Landmark, Fort Western was built in 1754 and is America's oldest surviving wooden fort. It was initially used as a storehouse that supported nearby Fort Halifax. Today the Fort exhibits the old general store, the main house, and of course, the fort itself. They are only open from 1-4 PM, so be aware of that when planning your visit.
